- Of the victims of hate crime in the current year to date, six have now been recorded as a repeat victim.

- Two repeat offenders have now been identified in the current year to date.

- Four youngsters, aged 16 or under, have been offenders of hate crime in the current fiscal year to date, three of these were involved in one incident.

## **THEFT & DISHONESTY**

The drop in solvency in respect of Housebreaking (HB) related crimes has resulted in the setting up of a dedicated team comprising of two experienced officers. This has already shown an increase in solvency of around 7%. Several of the HB and HBWI's being investigated occurred in recognised "hot spot" areas and are linked to known criminals. A large increase in metal thefts has resulted in a CID officer being appointed as a single point of contact and has already shown an increase in detected crime.

## **ROAD CASUALTIES**

It is pleasing to note a reduction in the number of serious injuries in collisions, placing us at four below our YTD target. A vehicle collision on the A1 in early November resulted in multiple injuries to occupants and highlights the impact one vehicle accident can have on performance figures.

#### **IMPROVING PUBLIC PROTECTION IN THE BORDERS**

Robust checking of Child Protection Forms now highlights any early issues in relation to Children and Young People enquiries ensuring that support and guidance is provided to front line officers and supervisors at the earliest opportunity.

#### **DRUGS & ALCOHOL**

Due to the endeavours of our new Drug/Alcohol Awareness Officer there has been a huge increase in presentations/talks to all communities focusing on our young people and the risks they face. Close partnership working with agencies including Alcohol and Drugs Partnership (ADP) and Face2Face has resulted in raised awareness and the innovative development of a peer education model.

The low figure in relation to test purchasing is due to a lack of volunteers that meet the criteria set and their subsequent short life in post. Recruitment is currently ongoing and should enable planned operations to take place in the months ahead. Both uniformed and specialist licensing officers continue to make regular checks to both on/off sales premises.
