Single Outcome Agreement (SOA) Background

The Scottish Government (SG) has set 15 National Outcomes. The National Outcomes are high level, but set the scene for developing the Outcome Agreements. To help specify/break down the National Outcomes, Councils can propose local outcomes. These local outcomes can be used to highlight important areas, specific to the individual Council writing the SOA.

Aligned to the 15 National Outcomes the SG have developed 55 'local' indicators. These indicators can be used to demonstrate delivery against each of the National Outcomes. In a similar way to local outcomes, Councils can supplement this list with their own locally developed indicators (e.g.) indicators that demonstrate delivery of any specified local outcomes.

As part of the agreement process, the Scottish Government must agree any Local Outcomes and Indicators.

Scottish Government Guidance

Local Outcomes : "The Scottish Government's starting position is that local authorities should base their draft SOAs on the freedoms and resources which they know will be at their disposal. Where a Council wishes additional support from the Scottish Government, the government will want to know why the action they are suggesting is so important in supporting a local outcome, what will be possible without this action and what other measures at the Council's own hand it is taking to support delivery of this outcome."

The bottom line being, that it is unlikely that setting a number of local outcomes that will be undeliverable without additional SG funding, will be seen as unacceptable.

- Indicators : "We do not want a multiplicity of one-off indicators we would want to see some commonality of these across multiple services."
 - "Councils should consider targets for Year 1, Year 2, Year 3 and the longer-term."
 - "It may be possible to build in additional measures to the existing set of local indicators), which could be used during the agreement process in place of similar, but less robust measures proposed by individual Councils in their draft SOAs."

What the SG are proposing is consistent with their aim of being able to monitor progress towards priority outcomes each year. This means that wherever possible, we as a Council must be able to monitor progress on a more regular basis than Annual. Otherwise there will be no way to take any rectifying action to influence delivery and no method of managing delivery of the SOA Effective internal monitoring/reporting of the SOA requires Monthly, Quarterly or Half-Yearly updates to indicators to ensure that any rectifying action required can be taken prior to submission of the SOA to the Scottish Government

There is likely to be some iteration as part of the agreement process (e.g. to refine/suggest indicators). However, it is important that the draft which Council's present in late March reflects the settled vision of priority outcomes in the local area. If there are areas requiring further development, these should be clearly identified. The Scottish Government will want to satisfy itself that all the National Outcomes have been considered by the Council and Community Planning Partners. The prioritisation of the National & Local Outcomes should be based on good evidence and analysis. Supporting indicators should be robust and relevant with timescales for achievement balanced between 1/2/3-year and longer-term deliverables.

Scottish Borders SOA

The following pages show the most up to date draft of the Scottish Borders SOA. This draft has been drawn together with contributions from Community Planning Partners as well as Council departments. The deadline for submission of this draft to SG is the 31st March 2008 and it is therefore important that the draft is in as good and complete a state as possible for then. The document is split to show :

- National Outcome
- Local Outcomes
- Indicators

The National Outcomes (wording etc) can be considered as set – there may be some small changes, but this is the set that all Local Authority areas are working to. Any indicators with a number in brackets after them e.g. [*15] are Nationally defined local indicators. These can also be considered as set (wording etc), as this is the list that all LA areas are working to. As said, there may be small changes to the national outcomes and indicators, but resource should be devoted to ensuring that the locally developed outcomes and indicators are good.

Prioritisation :

1) Scottish Government will be looking for evidence that National & Local outcomes have been prioritised and that this prioritisation is based on good evidence and analysis.

Local Outcomes :

- 1) Are these local outcomes required? (or does the national outcome express all that is important)
- 2) Do they highlight the 'priority' areas for the Scottish Borders (not just for Scottish Borders Council)
- 3) Are they too low level?
- 4) Are there any local outcomes missing?

Local Indicators

The Notes/Guidance section against each of the indicators is not part of the SOA template, but it is important that if required we can express why an indicator is important. Part of the agreement/challenge process from Scottish Government will be to clarify why we have proposed some indicators – as well as potentially why we have not proposed others

- 1) Are the proposed indicators robust? (does the data allow us to show accurate year on year progression)
- 2) Is the frequency of update sufficient to allow robust and challenging internal monitoring/reporting?
- 3) Are the indicators specific?
- 4) Is there ownership of the indicators? Without ownership/accountability, it is unlikely that the desired result will be delivered
- 5) Will movement in the indicators demonstrate that the Borders is delivering its SOA?
- 6) Is all the required information populated (baselines, timescales, targets, ownership...)
- 7) Are there indicators missing from the SOA?
