MINUTE of MEETING of the SELKIRK COMMON GOOD FUND SUB COMMITTEE held in the Committee Room, Victoria Hall, Selkirk on Friday 1 March 2013 at 2.30 p.m.

MINUTE

1. There had been circulated copies of the Minute of 31 October and 13 November 2012.

DECISION

NOTED the minute.

MONITORING REPORT

- 2. There had been circulated copies of a report by the Chief Financial Officer setting out details of transactions for the 9 Months to 31 December 2012 and projections of the annual outturn with variances from the final budget and the projected effect on Revenue and Capital Reserves at 31 March 2013. The report explained that expenditure was projected to be in line with the approved budget for 2012/13. Income was projected to be greater than budgeted by £28,445 due, in the main, to receipt of the insurance settlement for the snow damage to farm sheds, rent from a new source and higher than budgeted interest rates now being obtained on Capital Deposits in SBC Loan Funds. Appendix 1 to the report showed key financial data on the Revenue Performance and Balance Sheet for 2012/13. Appendices 2 to 5 provided details on the Revenue budget in an extended format, grants paid and payable, Revenue and Capital reserves and the performance of the Property Portfolio. There was a projection for total expenditure of £168,723 and income of £93,590 supplemented by a draw down of £54,564 from the Revaluation Reserve, resulting in an outturn net expenditure of £20,569, this being £28,388 lower than budget. With regard to grants and donations there was a total of £2,003 remaining in the 2012/13 budget with a commitment of £5,890 already approved from the 2013/14 budget.
- 3. Member of the public, Dr Neil, asked a number of questions about the Council's charges against the Common Good Fund relating to the negotiation of the occupation agreement for the fishing club and for the access agreements to land at Smedheugh. He was asked to put these questions in writing to the Council's Monitoring Officer, after which it was agreed that the best way forward was for a meeting to be arranged between Dr Neil, the Legal and Licensing Manager and Members of the Sub Committee to look at the figures concerned.

DECISION

- (a) AGREED to approve the financial performance for 2012/13 as shown in Appendix 2 to the report.
- (b) NOTED in the Appendices to the report:-
 - (i) key figures shown in Appendix 1,
 - (ii) Grants Analysis provided in Appendix 3

- (iii) projected balances on Revenue and Capital Reserves shown in Appendix 4
- (iv) performance of the Property Portfolio as shown in Appendix 5.

APPLICATIONS FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE Selkirk Football Club

4. There had been circulated copies of a request from Selkirk Football Club for a grant of £5,000 towards the cost of funding a 100 seat stand to provide better facilities for spectators and to comply with new Scottish Football Association Standards. Members were keen to support the Club and were minded to support the application in full. However clarification was required with regard to the total cost of the project and whether the £15,200 from the Scottish Football partnership was subject to other funding being in place, as Members did not wish to award a grant unless it was clear that the project was fully funded. The grant should be subject to planning permission and any other statutory consents being in place and it was also agreed that should the grant be made, once these matters had been clarified, the money should be released only on the receipt by the Council of the relevant invoices.

DECISION

AGREED:-

- (a) in principle to grant the sum of £5,000 to Selkirk Football Club towards the cost of a 100 seat stand subject to clarification of the following:-
 - (i) the total cost of the project;
 - (ii) whether the £15,200 from the Scottish Football Partnership was subject to any terms; and
 - (iii) that all statutory and landlord consents were in place.
- (b) that powers be delegated to the Chairman and Senior Financial Analyst to award the grant, subject to the clarifications sought and subject to the receipt by the Council of relevant invoices for the building of the stand for which the grant was required.

Selkirk Rhinos Rugby Club

There had been circulated copies of a request from Selkirk Rhinos Rugby Club for a grant of £700 towards the costs of a P7 tour to the Seapoint Tournament in Dublin, at the end of April 2013. Although an annual tour was held to mark the end of the eldest group's involvement in the Rhinos this was the first time that a team from the Scottish Borders had been invited to participate in this tournament in Ireland. The estimated total cost of the tour was £4,300. Members were in agreement to support the application subject to the grant being paid from the 2013/14 budget and subject to a written report about the tour being given to the Sub Committee in due course.

DECISION

AGREED to award a grant of £700, from the 2013/14 budget, to Selkirk Rhinos Rugby Club towards the cost of a tour to the Seapoint Tournament, Dublin, subject to a written report on the tour being given to the Sub Committee following the event.

6. In a discussion about the issue of grants and donations from the Selkirk Common Good Fund Councillor Ballantyne suggested carrying out some public relations work to convey the message that there was a limited amount of money available in the budget, to avoid raising undue expectations in the community and amongst groups who may be considering an application. It was agreed that a press release could be made available around the time of the next meeting and the presentation of the financial outturn report.

DECISION

AGREED to prepare a press release regarding the grants and donations budget at the next meeting of the Sub Committee.

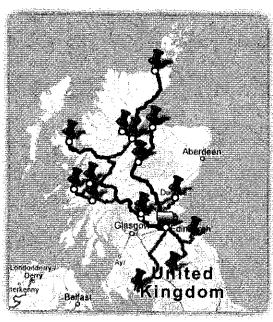

Directors' responsibilitles

The directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Standards and applicable law). Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for maintaining adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence to take reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Constitution and objectives

The Scottish Chamber Orchestra ("SCO") was established in 1974 and was incorporated as a company, limited by guarantee, on 4 June 1981.

The SCO is dedicated to the performance, creation and appreciation of music throughout Scotland, United Kingdom and internationally.

Our aim is to consolidate the SCO as one of the finest chamber orchestras in the world combining concert giving, education work, award winning recordings, and reaffirming our position as a major contributor to Scotland's international profile as one of the country's foremost cultural ambassadors, and one of Scotland's most internationally respected arts organisations.

This is achieved through a commitment to an extensive repertoire including the commissioning and performance of new music by Scottish and non-Scottish composers. It is also committed to a programme of educational, community and outreach activities undertaken throughout Scotland.

Structure, governance and management

The company's Memorandum and Articles of Association govern the activities of the company.

From 30 March 2011, the number of directors was as follows:

The full board of the company – which deals with strategic issues – meets four to five times per year.

Directors do not now retire by rotation, but take office for up to two three-year terms. In exceptional circumstances, Directors may be invited to take office for up to a further and final three years.

Day-to-day management of the company is delegated by the board to the Chief Executive, who is supported by a management team,

Review of activities and future plans

Within Scotland, the orchestra performed 110 concerts, spread across the Winter Season at the principal venues - Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, Dumfries and St Andrews and the traditional Perth Series with RSNO and BBC SSO; Scottish touring to the Highlands, South of Scotland, Autumn Classics across Central Scotland, cl@six, a series of short early evening concerts in Edinburgh and Chamber concerts in the Queen's Hall. A number of engagements were also fulfilled in Ayr, East Neuk, St Magnus, and Inverness. There were also concerts at the Edinburgh International Festival including the Virgin Money Fireworks concert.

In March 2012, the orchestra undertook a tour of Germany and also played a date in Spain.

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Directors' Report - continued

For the year ended 31 March 2012

During the year, the orchestra premiered four new scores. A new work by Martin Suckling (storm, rose, tiger); Gordon Kerry's Flute Concerto (written for the SCO's principal flute, Alison Mitchell); Haflidi Hallgrímsson's Violin Concerto and the Percussion Concerto by Sally Beamish, written for Colin Curry.

During the year, the orchestra made two recordings with Linn Records. Weber Wind Concertos featuring principal players from the SCO which was directed by Alexander Janiczek; The Berlioz Symphonie Fantastique and Beatrice and Benedict-Overture conducted by Robin Ticciati.

The coming year will see the Orchestra continue with its main season concert programme and summer touring to the South of Scotland and the Highlands. There will also be a European tour in November 2012.

The orchestra continued to develop its role as Orchestra-in-Residence at St Andrews University, through participation with the St., Andrews and Fife Community Orchestra, masterclasses for students and early evening chamber concerts.

SCO Connect's education, outreach and community activities were spread across the country from the North to the South of Scotland:

Full concert performances of *Big Ears, Little Ears* were given in Stirling, Edinburgh and Glasgow; *Scrapers & Tooters* was performed in Edinburgh and the Borders and *Wind Farm*, a strand of Scrapers and Tooters was performed in Aberdean; *Pre-Concert Talks, Study Days, Comparing Notes and Exploring Music* delivered insights into SCO repertoire; SCO began it's first Primary School Residency in Preston Street Primary School, Edinburgh; *Supersonic [comprising Bear Hunt and Giants' Chaos]* was performed in South Ayrshire and South Lanarkshire; SCO's partnership with the National Galleries of Scotland developed with *Musical Mondays* schools workshops and *Can a painting make a sound?* Family workshops at the National Galleries of Scotland; SCO Connect's national composition competition *iCompose* run in partnership with the National Galleries of Scotland, Drake Music Scotland and Roland and Linn Records entered its third year of the competition; SCO Connect worked in partnership with the National Trust of Scotland and Borders Council on the St. Abbs music project that culminated in the new commission 'Border Lines' by composer Howard Moody inspired by and celebrating the National Trust of Scotland's Nature Reserve at St. Abbs Head and its local communities.

Reserves Policy

The Board has identified a minimum reserve requirement equivalent to three months' costs, which will enable the company to meet commitments as they fall due. At 31 March 2012, general reserves stood at £157,502.

Investment Policy

The Board has set an investment policy for its endowment fund of balanced growth with medium risk. The day to day investment management has been delegated to a firm of investment managers. The main Investment objective is to protect the capital of the SCO in real terms.

Risk Management

The Board has assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and financing of the company, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Financial results

The results for the year are as detailed in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities on page 7. Changes to fixed assets are detailed in note 7 to the Financial Statements. A small operating surplus was achieved during the financial year and the Balance Sheet remains strong.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable UK accounting standards, Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006.

The directors are of the opinion that the Group can continue to meet its obligations as they fall due for the foreseeable future. As a consequence the directors have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis.

Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated SOFA and balance sheet include the financial statements of the company and its subsidiary, SCO Trading Limited up to 31 March 2012. No profit and loss account has been prepared for the company as provided by Section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

The financial statements of the SCO Trust Limited, a company limited by guarantee, have not been consolidated as it has been dormant since incorporation.

Funds

Unrestricted funds are income sources which are receivable for the objects of the charity without further specified purposes and are available as general funds.

Designated funds are unrestricted income sources which have been earmarked for a specific future purpose.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.

Transfers from unrestricted funds are made to meet any shortfalls in restricted projects.

Depreciation

Fixed Assets are stated at cost. Depreciation is provided on all fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Investments

Investments are shown at market value at the balance sheet date. Realised gains and losses are recognised in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they arise.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value in the ordinary course of business.

Scottish Government and Local Authority Grants

Grants credited to the revenue account in the year for which they are awarded.

Performance income and sponsorship income are credited to the revenue account on a receivable basis.

Notes to the Consolidated Financial Statements - continued

For the year ended 31 March 2012

1. Accounting policies - continued

Leases and hire purchase contracts

Where assets are financed by leasing agreements that give rights approximating to ownership ("finance leases"), the assets are treated as if they have been purchased outright. The corresponding leasing commitments are shown as amounts payable to the lessor.

Lease payments are split between capital and interest using the actuarial method. The interest element is charged to the revenue account while the capital portion reduces the amounts payable to the lessor.

All other leases are treated as "operating leases". Their annual rentals are charged to the revenue account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when the company has entered into a legal or constructive obligation.

Expenditure has been charged wherever possible directly to cost of generating funds, charitable expenditure, governance costs or other resources expended. When this has not been possible, an estimate had been made of the proportion charged to each activity.

Cost of generating funds comprises the costs associated with attracting sponsorship and other private donation income.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the statutory requirements of the charity and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Foreign currency translation

Assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

Pension commitments

The group operates a group personal pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the group in an independently administered fund.

Cash flow statement

The group is exempt from the production of a cash flow statement under the provisions of Financial Reporting Standard No1.

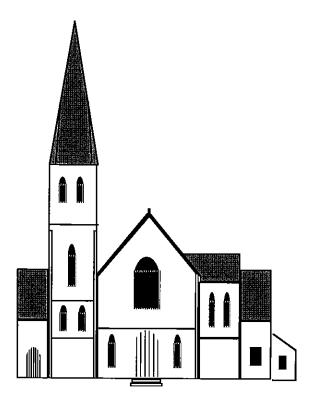

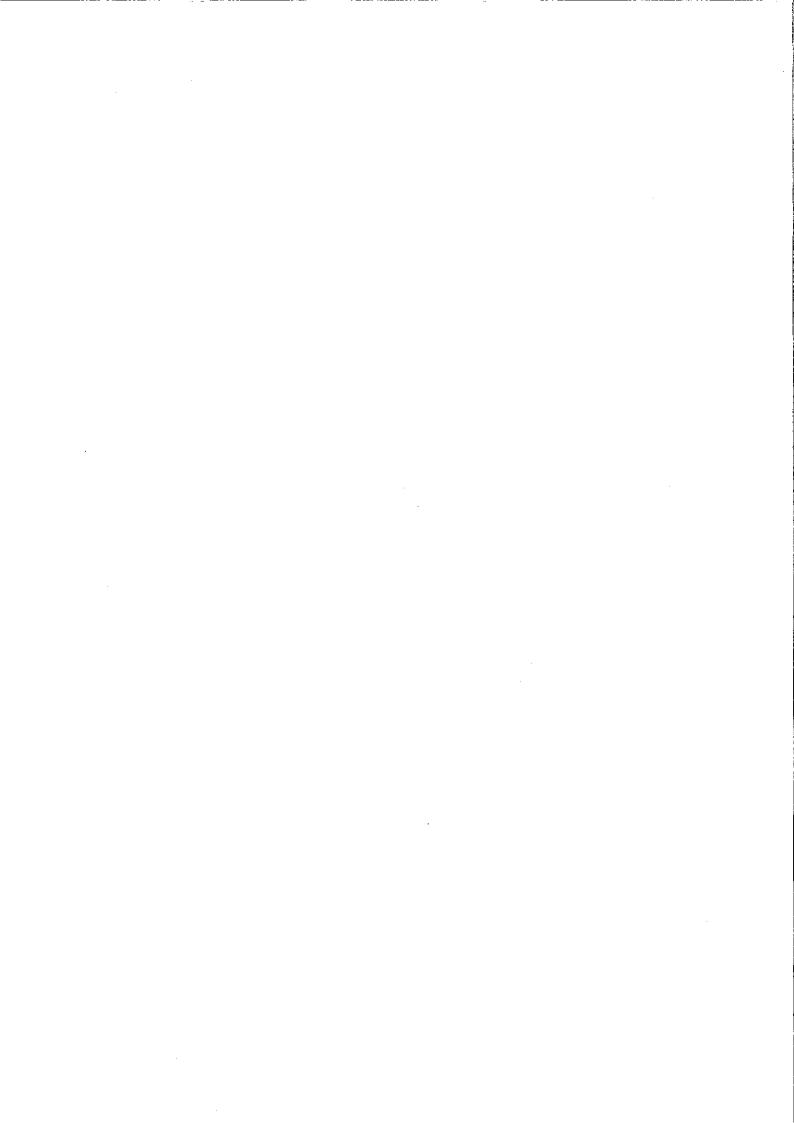

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Model).

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session and the Congregational Board are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery.

The Congregational Board is appointed from within the congregation and members of the congregation are invited to nominate individuals who are believed to have the skills and commitment to contribute to the management affairs of the Church, to become members of the Board. Board Members are then appointed at the Stated Annual Meeting and serve for a period of three years after which they must seek re-election at the next Stated Annual Meeting.

Organisational Structure

The Congregational Board, chaired by the minister, has met 6 times this year. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Finance Committee and the Property Committee as appropriate. The Kirk Session has met 9 times in 2012, and is responsible for spiritual affairs within the church. Joint meetings of the Kirk Session and the Congregational Board have taken place 3 times in 2012.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Selkirk Parish Church holds regular services of worship each Sunday and Wednesday mornings, and a monthly Worship for All service during term time. Other activities include 2 Prayer Groups, Choir, Sunday School, Ladies Fellowship, and Bible Study Groups for special events e.g. Lent.

Ecumenical activities include an annual United Service, Coffee Plus (for anyone but with an emphasis on toddlers and their carers), CAMEO (for the over 50s), Reach-Out (women's meeting), and an annual summer Holiday Club (for ages 5-12).

The Church, along with other congregations in the Presbytery, is continuing to develop a partnership with congregations in the Zomba Presbytery of Malawi.

The hall is well used by the community for various events e.g. coffee mornings, Pilates classes, Antiquarian Society meetings, mother and toddler groups etc..

Achievements and Performance

The following are average attendance numbers: Sunday congregation 80, Wednesday 35, Worship for All 25, Prayer Groups 6, Choir 11, Sunday School 3, Lent Study Group 22, Advent Study Group 6 Ladies Fellowship 25.

Financial Review

The principal source of income is regular offerings, (both WFO and Bankers Orders), 64% of the total coming from Gift Aided offerings. There have been some changes amongst our Gift Aid donors, but the number remains steady. This year we have slightly increased our level of giving to our unrestricted funds.

Reserves Policy

Our Reserve Fund holds £12,061, all other Reserves being investments held for us by the Church of Scotland Trustees. At the year end the Church held unrestricted cash funds of £29,528, of which £12,061 has been designated for the Reserve Fund, £4,345 for the Fabric fund, £108 for the Ladies Fellowship fund, and £245 for the Sunday School fund. This leaves a balance of £12,769 in the General fund. The Church also held £24,004 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified on page 7.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The members of the Kirk Session / Congregational Board must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session / Congregational Board are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Introduction

Every year the P7 Group (u-12) of players from the Selkirk Rhino Mini Rugby team undertakes a short tour. This marks the end of that group's playing for the Rhinos before entering High School.

This year the team went to Dublin to play in the Seapoint International Rugby Blitz, Ireland's largest mini rugby festival. 125 Teams entered the tournament from all the provinces of Ireland, Holland and Selkirk, representing Scotland. A full itinerary for the Tour is provided as an appendix to this report.

The purpose of this report is to provide members of the Selkirk Common Good Fund with details on the benefits of their contribution towards the costs of the Tour.



The Selkirk Rhinos operates teams from P1/2 level to P7. The Club is managed by a Committee of parent volunteers. Each team has two coaches, also parents

The Party

15 players participated in the Tour, accompanied by the two coaches and two parent helpers. There were 11 P7s and 4 younger S1 pupils that played. The 'top up' from S1 players was on account of there being insufficient numbers available/ experienced within the P7 level. All the boys were from Selkirk and the Lilliesleaf and Ettrick & Yarrow catchments.

The Event

We entered one squad of 14 players for the Under 12 competition, and were drawn in a Group of Seapoint RFC (Leinster), Wanderers FC (Leinster), Kinsale RFC (Munster) and Old Crescent RFC (Munster). In addition, the tournament organisers selected a 'Barbarians' Team, from the best players of these clubs, to play an additional game against Selkirk. Results: Played 5; Won 1; Drawn 1; Lost 3.

From a playing perspective the boys were exposed to a different set of rules and higher competition to what they were used to. With this, and the inevitable 'nerves', they started slowly, but even in the games they lost, they remained competitive to the end.

Costs

The team travelled by bus and ferry to Dun Laoghaire, in Co Dublin. They stayed in a hostel for two nights. These costs amounted to £2,700. Total subsistence costs were £1,100, and sundry costs of £400 included the price of a tour of the Aviva Stadium (formerly Lansdowne Road), train fares and drinks.

The Selkirk Common Good Fund provided a contribution of £700 towards these total costs of £4,200.

Support

A key objective for the organisers was that no child would be unable to travel for financial reasons. As such the contribution per household was restricted to £20. This would not have been possible without the efforts of fundraisers and supporters, and it could not have happened without the generous support of the Selkirk Common Good Fund.

The Selkirk Rhinos were also appreciative of the financial and 'in-kind' support and sponsorship from: ASDA, Bill McLaren Foundation, Bowhill Estates, John Rutherford, Oregon Timber, Susan Cottrell and Rhino Reactive Services.

Benefits

Before the tour, the anticipated benefits were:

- International travel experience for the boys.
- Improved rugby performance and development.
- Self-esteem responsibility of representing the club and the town at an international event.
- Learning and enhanced aspirations of rugby and travel and the link between participation in sport and wider opportunity.

These benefits were delivered, ans in addition a number of other benefits were secured:

- Profile links to Seapoint and other Irish clubs and the possibility of their attendance at Selkirk tournaments.
- Camaraderie spending time with each other on a Tour; meeting new people after the Tournament itself, it was noticeable how the Selkirk and Amsterdam teams mixed.
- The 'art of the possible' the effort made by a large number of parents and supporters was evidence to other teams and the children that the efforts were successful.
- Legacy raising the aspiration of future teams and other sports.
- Learning the Aviva Stadium Tour also involved a tour of the press and media facilities and showing the boys how reports are filed, press rooms, IT equipment etc.
- Lessons for the Club, participating in the Tournament, we have identified a number of examples of how we could improve our own rugby and tournaments and increase participation.

Conclusion

The Tour was a valuable experience for everyone involved, the Selkirk Rhinos, but particularly the players. They will never forget the experience and will always have that 'common bond' of participating in the International Mini Rugby Blitz.

The following week, the players attended a 'farewell dinner' at the Rugby Club where they were presented with various playing awards. The speakers at the dinner included a playing member of Selkirk RFC, Calum Johnston, a former Selkirk Rhino himself; and John Rutherford, the incoming president of Selkirk RFC. Both reminded the boys how lucky they had been to go on a rugby tour and described the benefits to them, as adults, of playing rugby. They underlined the importance of hard work and commitment, and how rugby introduced them to new people and new experiences. As a result of being on Tour these messages had an even greater resonance.

John Rutherford also brought a selection of his jerseys to the dinner and described the different jerseys and the countries they represent.
