# SCOTTISH BORDERS COUNCIL JEDBURGH COMMON GOOD SUB-COMMITTEE

MINUTE of MEETING of the JEDBURGH COMMON GOOD FUND SUB-COMMITTEE held in ROOM 1, KELSO HIGH SCHOOL on 9 December 2015 at 5.30 p.m.

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Present:- Councillors J. Brown, R. Stewart S. Scott, Community Councillor Mr. H. Wight. In Attendance:- Capital and Investments Manager (Kirsty Robb), Solicitor (Karen Scrymegour)

Democratic Services Officer (F. Henderson).

Members of the Public:- 0.

#### MINUTE

1. There had been circulated copies of the Minute of the Meeting held on 16 September 2015, with reference to paragraph 5, Community Councillor Wight advised that the Jed Shed wished to purchase the entire building at 5 Abbey Place, Jedburgh and not just the top floor.

#### **DECISION**

NOTED, subject to the amendment above.

#### **MATTERS ARISING**

2. With reference to paragraph 5 of the Minute of 16 September 2015, Karen Scrymgeour referred to a briefing note circulated to Members on 18 November concerning the former band hall, 15 Abbey Place, Jedburgh which sought confirmation from the Sub-Committee that the Jed Shed were looking to purchase the upper floor of 15 Abbey Place, Jedburgh being the former band hall premises, prior to a formal report being considered by the Sub-Committee. Karen Scrymgeour advised that the security stated that the £15,000 loan would be repayable on the sale of the property, which would mean that once the sale was complete the Jedburgh Community Trust would require to pay back the full £15,000. The minute of 16 September 2015 suggested the desire of both the Jed Shed and the Jedburgh Community Trust was for the loan not to be repaid but to be transferred from the Jedburgh Community Trust to the Jed Shed. The Common Good therefore would have to consent to the Jedburgh Community Trust not repaying the loan (and discharging the security) if the sale of the property went ahead and the Jed Shed proving a new security for the loan amount. Members expressed concern that the Jed Shed would not last in the future and the Common Good would be left with a property to maintain as part of the Common Good until it was sold. Community Councillor Wight advised that the concept of the Sheds were a modern innovation and expanding over the area and that it would be better to have an organisation in the property using it. Following considerable discussion, it was agreed that the matter be carried forward to the next meeting, in order to allow the Jedshed to submit a written proposal and funding application and for Legal and Finance Departments to prepare a report on the basis that the whole property be transferred to the Jedshed.

#### **DECISION**

- (a) NOTED that the Jedshed proposed to purchase the entire building at 15 Abbey Place, Jedburgh;
- (b) AGREED:-
  - (i) that the Jedshed be requested to submit a written proposal/funding application;
  - (ii) that Legal and Finance Departments draw up a formal report on the basis of the entire building being transferred; and Page 1

(iii) that the matter be placed on the Agenda for the next meeting of the Jedburgh Common Good Sub-Committee.

#### JEDFOREST INSTRUMENTAL BAND

3. With reference to paragraph 6 of the Minute of 4 February 2016, the Democratic Services Officer advised that a letter had been sent to the Treasurer of Jedforest Instrumental Band requesting an update in respect of the grant of £5,000 which had been made to the Jedforest Instrumental Band and which was to be used to release other sources of funding from the Awards for All and SBC Community Fund.

#### **DECISION**

- (a) NOTED that no response to the letter had been received.
- (b) AGREED that the matter be placed on the Agenda for the next meeting.

#### MONITORING REPORT FOR 3 MONTHS TO 30 SEPTEMBER 2015

4. There had been circulated copies of a report by the Chief Financial Officer which provided details of the income and expenditure for the Jedburgh Common Good Fund for the 3 months to 30 September 2015, full year projected out-turn for 2015/16 and projected balance sheet values to 31 March 2016. Appendix 1 provided a projected income and expenditure for 2015/16 and a projected deficit of £6,615 for the year. Appendix 2 showed a projected Balance Sheet to 31 March 2016 and a projected decrease in reserves of £18,215. Appendix 3 provided a breakdown of the property portfolio showing actual Income and Expenditure to 30 September 2015. Appendix 4 detailed the value of the Newton Fund to 30 September 2015. Councillor Stewart sought clarification with regard to the transfer of assets to the Culture Trust and Kirsty Robb advised that they would remain under the control of the Common Good with a lease being drawn up for the properties. Councillor Stewart requested that Jedburgh Community Council be made aware of the lease and arrangements for the Common Good so that they may consider the draft lease prior to it being signed and sealed and Kirsty Robb agreed to feedback to the Corporate Transformation and Services Director. Karen Scrymgeour advised that there was an offer in for the Provost Room, Jedburgh, and it was hoped to be settled prior to Christmas with a percentage coming back to the Common Good.

#### **DECISION**

- (a) AGREED the projected Income and Expenditure for 2015/16 as shown in Appendix 1 to the report.
- (b) NOTED:-
  - (i) the projected Balance Sheet value to 31 March 2016 in Appendix 2 of the report;
  - (ii) the summary of the property portfolio in Appendix 3 to the report;
  - (iii) the current position of the investment in the Newton Fund contained in Appendix 4; and
  - (iv) that Jedburgh Community Council requested they be given the opportunity to view the Leases for properties held by Jedburgh Common Good prior to finalisation.

# APPLICATION FOR FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE RIVERSIDE ROCK

5. There had been circulated copies of an application for Financial Assistance from Riverside Rock, Jedburgh in the sum of £2,000. The application explained that Riverside Rock was an annual Musical Family Day held within the grounds of Jedforest Rugby Club for local

residents and visitors to the town who used the local facilities. The Riverside Rock event in previous years had been funded mainly through Sponsorship, Donations and ticket sales (£37,943). Expenditure on the Festival in 2015 had been £35,799, resulting in a surplus of £2,144. The Bar on the day had taken £22,990 and after the deduction of expenditure £10,5898, £14,545 had been transferred to Jedforest Club Account. Following considerable discussion, it was agreed to award a grant of £2,000 to Riverside Rock.

### **DECISION**

AGREED to support the application for financial assistance from Riverside Rock in the sum of £2,000 towards the overall costs including stage hire, band costs and kids show for Riverside Rock 2016.

The meeting closed at 6.15 p.m.

#### 1 PURPOSE AND SUMMARY

- 1.1 This report provides the details of the income and expenditure for the Jedburgh Common Good Fund for the 9 months to 31 December 2015 and full year projected out-turn for 2015/16 and projected balance sheet values to 31 March 2016.
- 1.2 Appendix 1 provides a projected Income and Expenditure position. This shows a projected surplus of £6,485 for the year.
- 1.3 Appendix 2 provides a projected Balance Sheet to 31 March 2016. It shows a projected decrease in the reserves of £23,085.
- 1.4 Appendix 3 provides a breakdown of the property portfolio showing actual Income and Expenditure to 31 December 2015.
- 1.5 Appendix 4 shows the value of the Newton Fund to 31 December 2015.

## 2 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 It is recommended that the Common Good Sub Committee:
  - (a) Agrees the projected Income and Expenditure for 2015/16 in Appendix 1 as the revised budget for 2015/16.
  - (b) Notes the projected Balance Sheet value to 31 March 2016 in Appendix 2.
  - (c) Notes the summary of the property portfolio in Appendix 3.
  - (d) Notes the current position of the investment in the Newton Fund in Appendix 4.
  - (e) Notes the Income from Sale of 3 Exchange Street as full and final settlement (see para 4.4)

#### 3 **BACKGROUND**

3.1 This report provides the Committee with financial information for the period to 31 December 2015 and projections to 31 March 2016. The report also contains a projected balance sheet for the Common Good Fund to 31 March 2016.

#### 4 **FINANCIAL POSITION 2015/16**

4.1 Appendix 1 provides detail on income and expenditure for the 2015/16 financial year. The projected net position for the year is a surplus of £6,485, assuming full expenditure of the grants and donations budget of which £20,858 remains to be allocated.

## 4.2 Income & Expenditure – Rental Income

There is no Rental Income due from the Jedburgh Common Good properties.

## 4.3 Income & Expenditure – Non-Property Related Income

The projected out-turn includes an estimate for the interest receivable on cash deposited with the Council. This, however, does not show as an actual income until the end of the financial year as amount is dependent on interest rates and the average cash revenue balance invested with the Council over the full financial year. The annual rate of interest applied to the cash deposits is 0.4%, an amount of £225 has been budgeted for.

- 4.4 As a result of the successful sale of 3 Exchange Street, Jedburgh on 18 December 2015, a grant has been paid from Scottish Borders Council to the Jedburgh Common Good Fund, recognising the long standing use and inferred "ownership" of part of this property by the Common Good Fund. This has increased the income by £13,100 in 2015/16 funded by share of capital receipt. This is in full and final settlement.
- 4.5 The capital reserve is invested in the Newton Fund and distributions are made twice a year in September and February. Dividends of £12,823 were received in September 2015 in line with the proposed budget of £23,900 for the year. The proposed budget for 2015/16 is based on a distribution of 2.5% which will be subject to the overall performance of the fund.

## 4.6 Income & Expenditure - Property Expenditure

There are no Property Expenses on the Jedburgh Common Good properties.

## 4.7 Income & Expenditure - Grants & Other Donations

The grants and other donations distributed to 31 December 2015 are shown below.

## 4.8 Income & Expenditure – Depreciation Charge

The depreciation charge is projected to be £11,600 based on the revaluation of the properties at 1 April 2014. This is not a cash transaction and is off-set by a corresponding contribution from the Revaluation Reserve.

4.9 Appendix 2 provides the balance sheet value to 31 March 2015, the projected movement in year and a projected balance at 31 March 2016.

### 4.10 Balance Sheet - Fixed Assets

All fixed assets of the Common Good Fund are revalued every 5 years as part of the Council's rolling programme. The fixed assets were revalued at 1 April 2014. Appendix 3 shows the values of the individual properties at 31 March 2015, projected depreciation charges 2015/16 and projected value at 31 March 2016.

### 4.11 Balance Sheet - Newton Investment

- a) Investment markets continue to remain volatile. This is partly due to increasing uncertainties relating to the cooling Chinese economy and its sinking currency (significant losses on the Shanghai Stock Market resulted in it to be abandoned early twice in 4 days in early January). This volatility is also compounded by uncertainty on how the US economy will react to the 0.25% interest rate rise announced by the US Central Bank, the first rate rise for nearly a decade, with a pledge for further rate rises. There was a small but positive return in the Newton Fund of 1.3% for the quarter despite market volatility.
- b) Due to the volatility of the market conditions the projections do not include estimates for movements in the unrealised gains. Appendix 4 shows the performance of the Newton Fund since inception.

#### 4.12 Balance Sheet - Cash Balance

The cash held by the fund is projected to be £40,124, an in year projected increase of £11,485 mainly due to the increase in projected repayment of Principal on the Jedburgh Bowling Club Loan from £5,590 to £9,000 and income received for sale of Exchange Street property. The projected cash movement for 2015/16 is as follows:

## 4.13 Balance Sheet - Capital Reserve

The projections for the Capital Reserves include the unrealised gain for the Newton Fund as at 31 March 2015 but due to the extremely volatile nature of the markets no estimate has been made for the current years' movement.

## 4.14 Contingent Asset – Jedburgh Golf Club

The final accounts will also include a Contingent Asset of £25,000 for the remaining balance of the secured grant given to Jedburgh Golf Club in January 2005 for the purchase of two additional fields. This position will be reviewed on an annual basis to assess the likelihood of the Golf Club disposing of the fields.

4.15 Proposals by the Jed Shed to purchase 15 Abbey Place, Jedburgh have been noted and written proposals and funding applications to be submitted to Jedburgh Common Good.

#### **5 IMPLICATIONS**

### 5.1 Financial

There are no further financial implications other than those explained above in Section 4.

## 5.2 **Risk and Mitigations**

There is a risk that investments in the Newton Fund may reduce in value due to market or investment performance. This risk cannot be fully mitigated; however it is being managed by the selection of a Fund Manager with a clear objective of preserving capital values while aiming to produce returns in line with the benchmark

### 5.3 **Equalities**

It is anticipated that there are no adverse equality implications arising from the proposals contained in this report.

## 5.4 **Acting Sustainably**

Whilst there are no economic, social or environmental effects arising from the proposals contained in this report, there are, through the activities reported upon, positive impacts upon the economy through protection of employment, positive impacts upon the quality of community life and improvements in local amenities and nurturing of local talent. The potential improvement in levels of income through the use of the new investment fund will act to make the Common Good Fund more sustainable in the future.

## 5.5 Carbon Management

There are no effects on carbon emissions arising from the proposals contained in this report.

## 5.6 Rural Proofing

There are no effects on rural proofing arising from the proposals contained in this report.

5.7 **Changes to Scheme of Administration or Scheme of Delegation**There are no changes required to the Scheme of Administration or Scheme of Delegation arising from the proposals contained in this report.

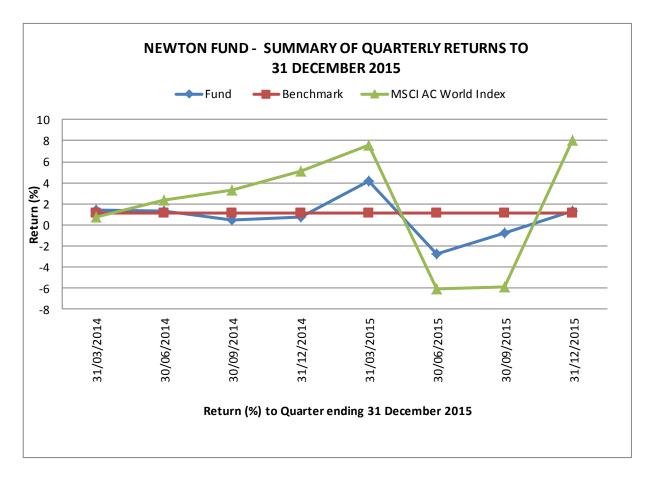

## JETHART CALLANTS CLUB

## CONSTITUTION

#### **RULES**

- 1. The Club shall be known as the JETHART CALLANTS CLUB.
- 2. The objects of the Club shall be:
  - (A) To preserve and stimulate an interesting the ancient customs and privileges of the Royal Burgh of Jedburgh - its history and traditions.
  - (B) To encourage the cultivation of local sentiment, and to foster local literature and song.
  - (C) To commemorate local incidents of historical importance, and to perpetuate by suitable memorial, or otherwise, the memory of notable townsmen.
- 3. The membership of the Club shall be unlimited. Members must be Connected with the town, or its immediate neighbourhood, either by birth, Decent from a native, or have a residence qualification of 20 years, and Must be supporters of the handball games at Candlemas and Fastern's Ee'n, and also of the annual Games.
- 4. The affairs of the Club shall be managed by a President, a Vice-President, A Secretary and a Treasurer (which offices may be combined), who shall be elected annually, along with a council of six, two of whom shall retire annually, and shall not be eligible for re-election until they have been out of office for one year. Five shall be a quorum.
- 5. The membership fee for Ordinary Members shall be 2/6 annually, Payable in January. Members in arrears with there subscriptions for two years shall be struck off the roll. The fee for life membership will be £1 1s Townsmen and Honorary Burgesses of the Royal Burgh may be elected Honorary Life Members in recognition of distinguished public service.

- 6. The Club will hold a social gathering at least once a year, preferably at Candlemas, Fastern's Ee'n or the games.
- The Secretary shall convene meetings of the Council of the Club at the request of the President, or at the written request of three members of the council.
- 8. The annual business meeting of the Club shall be held on 30<sup>th</sup> November (St Andrew's Day) except when it falls on a Sunday, when the meeting will take place on the Monday following. The Secretary and Treasurer will submit reports, and office-bearers for the ensuing year will be elected. Special meetings may be called whenever considered necessary by the Council or at the request in writing, of not less than Ten members.
- 9. Applications for membership shall be dealt with by the Council, and applicants must secure two-thirds of the votes of the members present.
- 10. The foregoing Rules shall not be amended or added to except at the Annual General Meeting, and the notice calling the meeting, shall state the proposed amendment or addition.

Notice of any alteration or addition must be giving to the Secretary fourteen days before the date of the annual meeting. No amendment or addition shall be come effective unless supported by two-thirds of the members present at the meeting.

NORTH BRITISH RAYON, JEDBURGH.

The above factory operated in Jedburgh as makers of viscose artificial silk, known formally as Rayon, between 1928 and 1956.

It was known to all as the silk mill and was by far the biggest employer in the town during those years.

Its founding on the 8 acre Canongate site was the biggest civic settlement in the town since the monks arrived to build the Abbey 800 years previously. Apart from war its coming was hailed as the Burgh's most important event of the 20th. Century.

NBR employed 800 in 1935 when the town population was 4000, having risen from 2068 in 1927.

Despite arriving as their economic saviour on the very cusp of worldwide depression (the Wall Street crash happened 4 months after start up) the industry with a raffish reputation was received with suspicion by a formidable minority of citizens. Indeed, some issues between the Company and Town Council lumbered along for the mill's entire tenure.

After surviving the early years of production ups and downs, of labour shortage, of environmental claim and counter claim, the Company settled in as might a 6ft. man in a 5ft. bed.

Eventually, NBR earned a worldwide reputation as the makers of the finest artificial silk viscose yarn and overtime gained the local respect it deserved..

When the first chill wind of redundances, caused mainly by competitive countries recovering from WW2 and paying meagre wages, blew through the departments of NBR in 1952, it signalled the start of a downward curve of fortunes not relieved until its closure in July 1956.

For 28 years the Silk Mill had been the major provider of wage packets in the town, had filled a role as its leading social eventer and provided a town buzz of wellbeing not felt since.

When the site was eventually cleared to allow the realignment of the A68 to open to traffic in 1976 the road route comprised a curved diagonal between the bridges which neatly divided the works site into two equal areas of former NBR manufacturing departments and offices. See attached drawing.

It is the Society opinion that the factory and its employees deserve to be commemorated for their massive contribution to the economic, social and political life and times of Jedburgh between 1928 and 1956.

We would therefore be grateful if Scottish Borders Council would kindly consider our proposal that the A68 road between the Canongate and Abbey End Bridges be identified as 'The Silk Road'. A weatherproof plaque with brief NBR details near to each bridge could be of interest to both townspeople and visitors.
