1. MINUTE

There had been circulated copies of the Minute of the Meeting held on 30 August 2023.

DECISION AGREED to approve the Minute for signature by the Chair.

2. BAP PLACE MAKING WORKING GROUP

The had been circulated copies of a report by Keith Dickinson, Chair of the Berwickshire Area Partnership Place Making Working Group that reported on the progress of the working group and made recommendations for future Place Making activity. The working group proposed that their activity was to be succeeded by a community-led peer support network which would provide a space for shared learning, support and guidance to communities that were developing plans for their area. The network would be open to all interested communities who would benefit from participation in the network and not restricted to Berwickshire. The network would be convened by Beth Landon from Borders Community Action in her role as Capacity Building Lead for Berwickshire and Cheviot. A standing item at Berwickshire Area Partnership meetings was suggested so that time was made available to hear from the proposed network and that community-led developments were discussed. Ms Landon advised she would be happy to speak on behalf of the Network and that a peer support meeting was scheduled for 1 February 2023.

DECISION

- (a) NOTED the achievements of the working group;
- (b) AGREED:
 - (i) To establish a community-led peer support network to support communities with ambitions to develop a plan for their area;
 - (ii) A standing agenda item should be introduced to the Berwickshire Area Partnership so that time is available at each meeting to hear from the network and discuss community-led developments within the Berwickshire community, with time also given for updates on local place plans and to consider themes and actions which could be incorporated into wider Berwickshire/Borders wide-plans; and,

(iii) Support the flexibility to reconvene the Berwickshire Area Partnership Place Making Working Group if there was a need to reactivate its activity in the future.

3. DATE OF NEXT MEETING

The Chair advised that the next meeting of the Berwickshire Area Partnership would be held on Wednesday 7 February. The meeting was to be moved to a Wednesday to allow people to attend who may normally have other commitments such as community council meetings.








Setting the scene

- The scale of the challenges faced in planning and delivering health services to meet need are unprecedented
- We must balance the delivery of safe, quality care within the financial and human resources available to us
- We have significant workforce challenges, with a smaller working age population (45% vs 65% nationally) operating across a large rural area and national shortages of specialist workforce in many areas
- Our financial deficit has continued to increase over the past few years due to growth in demand and changes in the cost of healthcare. We are projecting an overspend of £26 million by March 2024

Services in the community | Where are we now?

- Recruitment and Retention Challenges with independent contractors; GPs Dentists, Pharmacists, Opticians
 15% of Community Pharmacists have no regular Pharmacist on a day-to-day basis
 10% GP vacancy rate
- Demand for NHS dental services continues to increase but there are significant national challenges in recruitment and retention of general dental practitioners
- Many buildings in the community are old and require upgrading and expansion
- Primary Care Improvement Plan (PCIP): many services that used to be delivered by GPs are now provided by the Health Board (e.g. vaccinations and treatment rooms)
- Pharmacy First is an excellent service where you can receive treatment for a range of ailments direct from the community pharmacy
- Diversified and upskilled workforce new roles, e.g. Advanced Nurse Practitioners mean you don't always need to see a GP
- Health creating capacity what can you do to take responsibility for your own health?

What you have already told us

- Access to local primary care is important to people.
- When asked what the gaps in health and social care are, the second most common response was "access to a GP"
- In Berwickshire people said that GP recruitment and access to Dentists is an issue
- In Tweeddale feedback showed that GP communication has improved
- Carers reported needing more support from their GP in their caring role
- Post-diagnostic support for people with dementia is lacking
- Face to face appointments are important to many people

- **GP Fellowship scheme** to attract 'first five' GPs to the Borders
- First Contact Practitioner: Musculoskeletal Physiotherapy
- **Renew service:** a centralised service offering a 'see and treat' model for anxiety and depression
- **Urgent care pathway**: established in 2019, led by an Advanced Nurse Practitioner (ANP)

- Primary Care Improvement Plan (PCIP): continue to develop multi-disciplinary teams to support GPs, providing access to a range of healthcare professionals who support GPs providing comprehensive care to patients.

Community Bed Based Services | Where are we now?

- Many people in Community Hospitals do not need acute nursing care
- People are remaining in Community Hospitals for longer than they need to
- Health & Social Care availability is very limited
- It is difficult to recruit care staff

- In Cheviot and Teviot & Liddesdale people said the Community Hospitals are good but have limitations in beds and what they can do
- The role of the community hospital seems to be unclear to the public- is it urgent care recovery, hospice, specialist?
- There are ideas about expanding what the community hospital does to reduce pressure on the BGH

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


Acute Hospital Services Where are we now?

- All our beds are open all year round so we have no extra space when things get very busy
- Lots of beds are occupied by people who are ready to move to their next place of care. Hospital is not the safest place to be if you are medically fit to move on, especially if you are frail
- We have faced some significant staffing challenges, although this is improving but there are still national shortages of registered nursing and medical staff
- Our performance is not where we want it to be (e.g. A&E 4 hour target)
- Recovery following the Pandemic is difficult with lots of people waiting a very long time to get their treatment
- We need to consider how the Borders General Hospital operates over the next 10-20 years

What you have already told us

- It was a common theme that we are generally good in a crisis but we need to ease pressure by reducing need for crisis response
- There was generally positive feedback about inpatient care
- The BGH is not easy to get to for everyone in the Borders, especially in an emergency

- Successful International recruitment: 60 Registered Nurses/Allied Health Professionals and 15 International Medical Graduates
- Virtual Ward pilot (respiratory)

Mental Health Services | Where are we now?

- Significant staffing challenges e.g. Psychiatry Consultant staffing is 43% below establishment
- 'Safe staffing' levels are difficult to achieve across inpatient areas
- Performance is much lower than we would like (e.g. Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services)
- Recovery following the Pandemic is difficult with lots of people waiting a very long time to get their treatment
- Many buildings are old and require upgrading and expansion
- Health creating capacity what can you do to take responsibility for your own health?



What you have already told us

- Across localities it was perceived that there are challenges within Mental Health services
- The Mental Health Forum said that they had good experiences of multi-agency responses, Local Area Co-ordinators providing support and good coproduction of service design and delivery
- Waiting times for mental health services are concerning
- Some people accessing mental health services said they had good experiences with their GPs but those in the LGBTQ+ community said that GPs could improve their support

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Report of Neighbourhood Support Fund Assessment Panel BAP Meeting on Wednesday 7th February 2024

Introduction

This paper outlines the recent work undertaken by the Assessment Panel for the Berwickshire Area Partnership, Neighbourhood Support Fund. It gives a brief description of various activities and a review of recent applications. It goes on to make recommendations for consideration by the BAP.

Berwickshire Neighbourhood Support Fund 2022/23

Berwickshire Area Partnership, Neighbourhood Support Fund, Assessment Panel (NSF AP) met for the second full meeting of the financial year, at 11am on Wednesday 17th January 2024. Only £50.2k was available for distribution through the Neighbourhood Support Fund during 2023/2024. Following the awards made in the first round of funding this year circa £14.4k remained (an additional £4.5k was ring fenced for an earlier an earlier approved award). In summary we had circa £14.4k available to distribute between five projects, together seeking a total of £15.4.

It is clear that more applications are being made by communities taking on activities that were in the past provided by SBC and other statutory bodies. Communities are willing to take on these roles, commit a lot of time and effort and save SBC a great deal of money. This needs to be recognised and volunteers deserve to be supported adequately through the NSF.

It is unfortunate, therefore, that the NSF was halved this year. As a result, many deserving applicants from both rounds, will have been disappointed that their strong applications did not receive support. It is hoped that this situation can be reversed when setting the NSF budget for next year.

Panel Membership

We are pleased that two new members have joined the Assessment Panel this year: Nicky Seed and Bob Hope. Having been a party to the development and implementation of our assessment process over the past four years, and Chair

of the Assessment Panel since its inception, I feel it is time to stand down. This will be my last report as Chair of the Assessment Panel.

There is always a need to recruit additional members and attain a full complement of panel members. Anyone interested in joining the panel should contact Gillian Jardine <u>GJardine@scotborders.gov.uk</u> or James Purves <u>JPurves@scotborders.gov.uk</u> for further information.

Attaining full delegated powers for the Assessment Panel

At its meeting on 4th March 2021 the BAP agreed to the following recommendation:

"We recommend the creation of a sub-subcommittee of the BAP with full delegated powers to undertake the assessment of applications and subsequently make awards."

At the BAP meeting 9th June 2022 our recommendation that "the Neighbourhood Support Fund – Assessment Panel receives full delegated powers to make and communicate its decisions to applicants" was again endorsed by the BAP.

At the BAP Meeting on Thursday 9th February 2023, we reiterated this request. We continue to feel that it would be beneficial to uncouple the work of the Assessment Panel and the BAP and move to three equally spaced application periods on an annual basis. We could then publish these dates well in advance and deal with applications more timeously.

We have over the last three years proved that we can undertake the role of an Assessment panel fairly and robustly. None of our recommendations have ever been overturned and our processes have been widely praised. It is therefore time for the Assessment Panel to be given full delegated powers.

Recommendation 1

We seek BAP support to request that SBC agree that:

1. The Berwickshire Neighbourhood Support Fund – Assessment Panel receives full delegated powers to make and communicate its decisions to applicants.

2. The NSF assessment process moves to a cycle of three, equally spaced, funding rounds each year, with the prospect of applicants receiving a decision within four weeks of the closing date for applications.

Assessment of Applications

I have outlined the assessment process many times, as I have recorded in my reports over the past three years. Suffice to say we have a very robust system of assessment that recognises the need for: transparency; appropriate declarations of interest; applications to comply with the published Eligibility Criteria and blind marking of all applications. We have managed throughout to achieve a strong measure of agreement on applications and move relatively smoothly to a consensus and agreement on our recommendations.

The minutes of the assessment panel meeting held on Wednesday 17th January 2024 can be seen in **Appendix 1** below. These minutes includes a brief description of each application and some individual feedback from our deliberations. Our recommendations are summarised in the minutes.

Recommendations 2

1. WELCOME

KD welcomed everyone to the meeting.

2. MEMBERSHIP OF THE ASSESSMENT PANEL

KD asked those present to promote membership of the panel to others to see if they would like to be involved – any interested parties to be passed contact details of GJ who can provide more information. KD noted that he would be standing down as Chair of Assessment Panel after then next BAP meeting. Anyone interested in stepping up as Chair to contact GJ.

JA advised that he had not been sent scoring sheets and GJ explained that a decision had been made historically that Elected Members were not asked to score applications as they cannot take decisions when they are not in a public meeting. KD welcomed the willingness of Elected Members to be fully engaged in the assessment and scoring process

3. BALANCE OF NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT FUND

The current balance of the Berwickshire NSF is £14384 with applications totalling 15,814.25.

There is also an additional £4500 which has been ringfenced for a Horse Time 'Resilience and Regulation' application which had been carried over from the Community Fund 21/22.

4 PROJECT ASSESSMENTS

COLDINGHAM PRIMARY PFA – LOOSE PARTS PROJECTS

An application from Coldingham Primary PFA requesting £5,000 was received for the purchase of a Loose Parts Hub which would be sited at Coldingham Primary School playground.

Discussion took place regarding the application, the panel were supportive however a possible issue with requirement for planning permission identified. – This has been communicated to the group and the panel requested that the group be supported if necessary to manage this process.

Recommendation

It was agreed to recommend that the Berwickshire Area Partnership **award** a grant of **£5,000.00** subject to necessary planning permissions being obtained. Funding not to be issued until these are in place.

COLDSTREAM GATEWAY ASSOCIATION (COLDSTREAM IN BLOOM)

An application requesting £1000.00 was received for their Courthouse Place Car Park

Flower beds project for the purchase of perennial plants.

Recommendation

It was agreed to recommend that the Berwickshire Area Partnership **award** a grant of **£1000.00**

SEA THE CHANGE

An application requesting £5000.00 was received to part fund a coordinator to take forward their Berwickshire Bikes Project. Our guidelines state that some salary costs specific to projects can be applied for. However, the panel feel it would be better to focus support on the delivery of specific elements of the proposed project.

The application was discussed at length by the panel with some members expressing their support, while others questioned whether the project was at too early a stage for the fund to be able to support.

It was suggested that had the application been looking for more specific items rather than a development coordinator that the application may have been more successful. NS suggested that BAVS may be able to help with the development work for the project and offered to link in with the group if they wish.

Recommendation

It was agreed to recommend that the Berwickshire Area Partnership **do not award** a grant on this occasion.

SWINTON AND LADYKIRK COMMUNITY COUNCIL

An application requesting £414.25 was received for the refurbishment of village benches, a Swinton Enhancement Group Banner and Safety wear and equipment.

Recommendation

It was agreed to recommend that the Berwickshire Area Partnership **award** a grant of **£414.25**

COLDINGHAM COMMUNITY COUNCIL

An application requesting £4,400 was received to purchase a PA system.

There was some discussion regarding this application as it had been received a few days past the deadline. JA explained that there were extenuating circumstances which led to the late application. KD noted that he felt that if an application came in late, but not so late that its inclusion in that round of funding would affect the effective administration of the other grants, then it could be deemed as acceptable. Council Officers to make a judgement call upon this and only circulate valid applications to the panel.

The panel were generally supportive of the application as it would allow the group to become more self-sufficient, potentially lead to more events being held for the community and that the purchase of the PA system would allow community members to be trained in its use giving community members a chance to learn a new skill.

Recommendation

It was agreed to recommend that the Berwickshire Area Partnership award a grant of **£4,400**.

HORSE TIME RING- FENCED FUNDS

The Panel discussed and viewed the evaluation form and agreed that the ring-fenced funds could now be released as the conditions for the second payment had been met.

5. EVALUATION OF THE BERWICKSHIRE NSF AND ASSESSMENT PROCESS

KD asked the panel for feedback regarding their experience of following the NSF Assessment Panel Process.

A general discussion took place, and the panel felt that overall, the process worked well and made the following positive observations:

- Blind scoring is good.
- Clear and fair process.
- Plenty of opportunity for discussion which allows for consensus decision.

The Panel made the following suggestions for possible areas of improvement:

- Having a larger pool of panel members to ensure that all areas of Berwickshire were represented and to ensure that enough panel members were available to make decisions.
- Providing more support to inexperienced applicants regarding the completion of their applications.
- Possible further development of the application form to ensure that the specific information requested in the application form clearly relates to the assessment criteria.
- Panel members being sent copies of the evaluation forms of completed projects so they can see the effectiveness of projects and the value of the NSF.
- Asking groups for details of volunteer hours projected/used to carry out projects within the application and evaluation.
- Making a representation to the council to request a larger budget as it was felt that often community groups are looking for financial support to carry out work that historically would have been carried get by the council.

KD requested information regarding the total number of applications received and the amount of funding requested from the NSF over the past year. AB to compile.

6. NEXT ROUND OF FUNDING

GJ asked the panel to discuss, should community funding be available in 2024/25, when they would like to reopen the fund and how many funding rounds they would like to have next year.

KD suggested 3 equally spaced application rounds per year.
