Community Choices

Our Parks and Environment Team shared learning with SBC senior management on the grass management pilot they are undertaking with communities. The pilot is running across five areas of Scottish Borders with an aim to improve outcomes for communities by enabling more cuts on priority areas by recalibrating our cutting frequencies. Part of this involves identifying opportunities for naturalised grass or biodiversity areas which require less cutting during peak growth times, freeing up staff time to service the priority sites. This all recognises that our 20-working day cutting frequency as a one-size-fits-all approach has not always delivered the best outcome for communities, which we are seeking to improve on. The objective is to trial a grass management pilot to empower both staff and communities to agree a more flexible approach to grass management which reflects local priority and need, whilst providing a balanced approach to service delivery and delivers biodiversity benefits. A pilot evaluation report will be presented at the end of the season.

Community Empowerment

Currently, there are no formal Participation Requests being considered within the Eildon locality.

Scottish Borders Council is currently involved in initial Asset Transfer discussions with two community-based groups and advancing discussions with a third community-based group.

MINUTE of Meeting of the EILDON AREA PARTNERSHIP held in the Council Chamber, Council HQ and via Microsoft Teams on Thursday, 28 March 2024 at 2.00 pm

1. **WELCOME**

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting of the Eildon Area Partnership and explained that it was being held to consider funding applications.

2. **NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT FUND 2023/24**

2.1 There had been circulated copies of applications to the Neighbourhood Support Fund 2023/24 with the agenda. The Chair invited the Community Engagement Officer, Mr Erin Coltman, to provide a summary of the applications.

2.2 Lauderdale Initiative

Mr Coltman explained that the Lauderdale Initiative had been awarded £10k at the meeting of the Eildon Area Partnership in September 2023 to fund the purchase and installation of Christmas lights on Lauder High Street. The Group had delivered their project with an underspend of £1,785 due to some of the required works being carried out by BEAR Scotland for no charge. The Group had requested that they retain that underspend to fund the purchase and installation of two motifs and an LED tree topper. The Assessment Panel had recommended that £814.31 be retained by Lauderdale Initiative, with the remaining £970.69 returned to the Neighbourhood Support Fund.

2.3 Bowden Village Committee

The application from Bowden Village Committee was for £5k to assist in a project being undertaken to restore the Brunton Fountain. The overall project aimed to restore the Fountain's foundations, archive the process, collect, and collate the history of Thomas Brunton for a booklet, increase public awareness, seek Category C listed status, and arrange for the Brunton family grave in Bowden Kirkyard to be cleaned. The final phase of the project was to use strong conservation practice to reinstate and make sound the foundations of the Fountain and re-erect a cleaned and re-inscribed fountain with the original fixtures and fittings. The Assessment Panel had recommended that the project receive the funding in full, however payment would be withheld until confirmation of an award from the Fallago Rigg Environment Fund or that the deficit was covered by another funding source.

2.4 Members discussed the applications in detail and highlighted that the funding for the Bowden Village Committee project was reliant upon a portion of the underspend from the Lauderdale initiative project being returned to the Neighbourhood Support Fund pot.

Members unanimously agreed that the full underspend from the Lauderdale Initiative be returned to the Neighbourhood Support Fund. Members considered the historical and

cultural importance of the Brunton Fountain and unanimously agreed to approve the application for £5k from Bowden Village Committee.

The meeting concluded at 2.20 p.m.

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Eildon Neighbourhood Support Fund 2024/25 - Criteria

The panel discussed the criteria that was in place for the 2023/24 and were mostly content with the current wording and the maximum grant award set at £10,000.

For 2024/25, the panel would like to add in some additional wording, as follows:

"Applications from organisations that have previously received funding from the Eildon Neighbourhood Support Fund will be considered on their own merits. However, preference will be given to those organisations that can demonstrate their project is financially viable and justifiable and that steps to explore other avenues of funding have already been taken."

There have been many discussions throughout the 2023/24 financial year regarding applications for projects that require recurring funding year-on-year and whilst the panel is keen not to outright exclude organisations from applying if their annual project/event requires support, they do want to ensure applications for a wide variety of projects are given the opportunity of financial support from the Eildon Neighbourhood Support Fund.

Eildon Assessment Panel Membership

Three of the current panel members have reached the end of their three-year appointment. This was discussed at the most recent panel meeting and there was a real sense of disappointment that the three-year period had come to an end as all members have enjoyed the challenging and rewarding nature of the assessment process.

The question was raised whether the current members could stay on the panel in their current position, and from an officer perspective, we are happy to support that. However, we felt it was important to raise this at the Area Partnership to ensure that members and attendees were comfortable with this. As officers, we also recommend that there is another recruitment drive to encourage more members of the Eildon community to join the assessment panel to introduce new perspectives to the assessment process and to continue to provide an opportunity for volunteers to have a say on where their locality's community funding is spent.
