Dear Sir/Madam

We wish to object to the current license application of Panna restaurant which extends to midnight. During a committee meeting regarding planning applications by the owner, it was stated by the representative of the owner that the restaurant would close at 10.30pm on a week day and 11pm at the weekend. The presence of a restaurant (noise as people enter and exit the premises; car parking in the street and noise of banging car doors late at night, takeaway drivers and running engines, waste etc.) is already going to cause a major disruption to the residents of this previously quiet (during the evening) street in a Conservation area. To be given such a late night license will serve to add the negative impact on residents in Dean Park and Northgate. We would like to add that most living quarters and bedrooms are at the front of the houses which will be directly impacted by the restaurant. A late midnight drinks license will promote late night noise related to drunkenness on the premises which is only yards away from residential properties with associated anti-social behaviour as people leave the premises and walk past the properties of Dean Park and Northgate or indeed loiter outside before they move on. It is simply not acceptable that we should have to call the police every time this activity wakes us or our children up. Consistent and continual noise due to alcohol, well past the stated closing times, will have a severe impact on the well-being of residents. If a license is granted it should only cover a period sometime before the restaurant has said it will close and closing time has been stated to be 10.30pm on a week night and 11.00pm on a weekend although it should be much earlier on a Sunday when many residents will have an early start on a Monday.
