Comment:

Peebles Rugby Club are looking for funding to support the running of their festival of rugby which is due to take place over the weekend of 4th to 6th August.

The three day sporting event is part of the King of the Sevens Rugby calendar. This event was cancelled last year as a result of Covid.

This year the event aims to include the regular competitions of men's, under 18 & 16s rugby but it will introduce a new element of including a ladies tournament, games for over 35s and also incorporating Clan Rugby. Clan Rugby is an inclusive form of rugby that enables those with physical and mental health along with learning challenges to play, and enjoy rugby.

The group are requesting funding to cover the costs of;

- Pitch hire at the Gytes Leisure Centre
- Hire of Marquee
- Memorial Trophy and Medals
- Hire of toilets
- Hospitality for participating teams

In securing funding for these items this will allow free access to the event for all spectators and teams. In previous years spectators had to pay to attend the event.

The event will be the first outdoor event in Peebles this year. The Peeblesshire community normally has a busy summer calendar including the Beltane festival and Highland Games, all of which have been cancelled this year. Peebles Rugby Club aim for the festival of rugby to provide entertainment for those in the community that are missing out on social interaction.

In providing an outdoor event with appropriate facilities this will allow those that are isolated or have previously been shielding to interact within the community again. In securing funding it all allow the event to be free to access for all.

Comment:

It is expected that 40 teams will be competing over the weekend and the event is open to all clubs across the Scottish Borders. The tournament will also incorporate women's rugby and also Clan rugby which will make this an inclusive festival and allow for these teams to compete locally as well as the opportunity to showcase ladies and disability rugby to the wider community. A social evening has been organised for the Friday evening to support the under 16s.

The event will be free of charge to attend to help open the event up to those who would not normally attend and those who have been financially impacted by Covid or have been struggling with isolation. The festival's main aim is to encourage people to engage with community activity again. Free entry also allows family and friends the opportunity to come along and support the team members from all clubs. The use of a QR code system will inform the organisers of how many are attending to help them manage numbers in line with restrictions. As the event is free of charge there won't be any financial barrier for clubs to participate.

Over 100 inter-generational volunteers are connected with the club and this will be the first event since Covid where they have been able to re-connect and work together.

Members of Clan Rugby have not played for nearly two years due to the pandemic and lockdown so this festival offers members the opportunity to re-engage with the sport and re-connect with their peers.

Comment:

It will allow an opportunity for those individuals who are isolated or have been shielding an opportunity to engage in community activity again in a safe environment that is outside.

Many clubs within the Borders have expressed an interest in being part of the festival. The club have received a lot of interest from ladies teams to participate and the club now anticipate that they will host an increased ladies tournament next year, due to the demand. The club are hopeful that this will provide a catalyst for Peebles Rugby Club to start their own ladies section, allowing ladies to play locally instead of having to travel to Biggar or Edinburgh.

Peebles Rugby Club hope that by having a more inclusive festival they will be making connections between different communities.
