| The Gibson Park should be on Common Good Register | This park forms part of land held by the Council as trustees for the Gibson Trust, so cannot be added to the Common Good Register. | No action |
| The Golf Club should be on Common Good Register | This land was purchased by the Burgh in 1921 in terms of Burgh Police (Scotland) Act 1892 for use as a recreation ground. This statutory purpose precludes the land from being added to the Common Good Register. | No action |
| The "Triangle " should be on Common Good Register | This land forms part of land held by the Council as trustees for the Ormiston Trust, so cannot be added to the Common Good Register. | No action |
| Weirhill should be on Common Good Register | This land was acquired by the Parochial Board of Parish of Melrose 1860 in terms of Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act 1855. This statutory purpose precludes the land from being added to the Common Good Register. | No action |
| Do the cash funds noted on the register include the sum of £1,000 which came from a trust fund to set up a Melrose Common Good fund? | Yes. This was the Fraser bequest, which was transferred to Melrose CG at the time it was established formally in 2014. | No action |
